We go through the rules - 1 whistle means stop, 2 whistles mean come back to base and the 3rd rule is to have fun & learn!








Boundary flags

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We finished our session with some play time!







THE LEAVE NO TRACE SEVEN PRINCIPLES



PLAN AHEAD AND PREPARE

Know the regulations and special concerns for the area you'll visit. Prepare for extreme weather, hazards, and emergencies. Schodule your trip to avoid times of high use. Visit in small groups when possible. Consider splitting larger groups into smaller groups, Repackage food to minimize waste. Use a map and compass to eliminate the use of marking paint, rock clarins or flagging.

TRAVEL AND CAMP ON DURABLE SURFACES

Durable surfaces include established trails and campistes, rock, gravel, dry grasses or snow. Protect riparian areas by camping at least 200 feet from labes and streams. Good campistes an elound, not made. Altering a site is not necessary. In popular areas: Concentrate use on existing trails and campistes. Walk single file in the middle of the trail, even when wet or muddy. Keep campistes small. Focus activity in areas where vegetation is absent. In pristine areas: Disperse use to prevent the creation of campistes and trails. Avoid places where impacts are just beginning.





DISPOSE OF WASTE PROPERLY

Pack it in, pack it out. Inspect your campaite and rest areas for trash or spilled foods. Pack out all trash, leftover food and littler. Deposits solid human vaste in catholes due to 6 to linches deep, at least 200 feet from water, camp and trails. Cover and disguise the cathole when finished. Pack out toilet paper and hygiene products. To wash yourself or your dishes, curry water 200 feet away from streams or lakes and use small amount of biologicalistic soup. Scatter strained

LEAVE WHAT YOU FIND

Preserve the past: examine, but do not touch cultural or historic structures and artifacts. Leave rocks, plants and other natural objects as you find them. Avoid introducing or transporting non-native species. Do not build structures, furniture, or dig trenches.



MINIMIZE CAMPFIRE IMPACTS

Campfires can cause lasting impacts to the backcountry. Use a lightweight store for cooking and enjoy a candle lateren for light. Where fires are permitted, use established fire rings, fire pans, or mound fires. Keep fires small, or use sticks from the ground that can be broken by hand. Burn all wood and coals to ash, put out campfires completely, then scatter cool ashes.

RESPECT WILDLIEF

Observe widdlife from a distance. Do not follow or approach them. Never feed animals. Feeding widdled changes their health, alters natural behaviors, and opposes them to predators and other dangers. Professionally and opposes them to predators and other dangers. Professionally and trash securely. Control pets at all times, or leave them at home. Avoid wildlife during sensitive times antaline, resting, realing vounce, or winter.

BE CONSIDERATE OF OTHER VISITORS

Respect other visitors and protect the quality of their experience. Be courteous. Yield to other users on the trail. Step to the downfill side of the trail when encountering pack stock. Take breaks and camp away from trails and other visitors. Let nature's sounds prevail. Avoid loud voices and noises.
