
We had lots of fun and finished our session with some play time!

THE LEAVE NO TRACE SEVEN PRINCIPLES

PLAN AHEAD AND PREPARE



Know the regulations and special concerns for the area you'l visit. Prepare for extreme weather, huzards, and emergencies. Schedule your trip to avoid times of high use. Visit in small groups when possible. Consider splitting larger groups into smaller groups. Reguladage food to minimize waste. Use a map and compass to eliminate the use of marking paint, rock cairns or flagging.

DISPOSE OF WASTE PROPERLY

Pack it in, pack it out. Inspect your campsite and rest areas for trash or spilled foods. Pack out all trash, leftover food and litter. Depoids solid human waste in catholes dug 6 to 8 inches deep, at least 200 feet from water, camp and trails Cover and diguise the cathole when finished. Pack due to talleit paper and hygiene products. To wash yourself or you dishes, carry water 200 feet away from streams or lakes and use small amounts of biodegradable soap. LEAVE WHAT YOU FIND

Preserve the past: examine, but do not touch cultural or historic structures and artifacts. Leave rocks, plant and other natural objects as you find them. Avoid introducing or transporting non-native species. Do no build structures, furniture, or dig trenches.

MINIMIZE CAMPFIRE IMPACTS

Campfires can cause lasting impacts to the backcountry. Use a lightweight stove for cooking and enjoy a candle lantern for light. Where fires are permitted, use established fire rings, fire pans, or mound fires. Keep fires small. Only use sticks from the ground that can be broken by hand. Burn all wood and coasts oas shu you campfires complete-

RESPECT WILDLIFE

Observe wildlife from a distance. Do not follow or approach them. Never feed animals. Feeding wildlife damages their health, alters natural behaviors, and exposes them to predators and other dangers. Protect wildlife and your food by storing rations and trans securely. Control pets at all times, or leave them at home. Avoid wildlife during sensitive times muttine, nesting, rating young, or wines.

BE CONSIDERATE OF OTHER VISITORS

Respect other visitors and protect the quality of their experience. Be courteous. Yield to other users on the trail. Step to the downhill side of the trail when encountering pack stock. Take breaks and camp away from trails and other visitors. Let nature's sounds prevail. Avoid loud voices and noises.
