We focus on the children's wellbeing and provide many opportunities to support each child with the transition from home to nursery school. At self-registration, on arrival to nursery, the children put their names under a happy or sad face according to how they feel at the time. This gives us an opportunity to see which children may need some extra support from us. The children begin to talk about their feelings, particularly happy and sad, at this time.

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Please talk with your child about the names of the staff and other children in their class.

September Songs and Rhymes

Nursery rhymes are of great importance to your child's language development. We say them every day with the children, as not only are these fun but they teach basic concepts of rhythm, rhyme, pace and volume, develop listening skills and extend vocabulary. Reciting and singing action rhymes stimulates many parts of the brain and creates neural connections and pathways that otherwise may not be formed. Please sing, or say these nursery rhymes with your child.

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How you can help and support your child at home:-

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Each month we provide suggestions for you to further support your child at home and help them develop in each of the six areas of the nursery curriculum.

Personal, Social & Emotional Development

Encourage your child to take off and hang up their own coat. Encourage your child to talk about what makes them happy at nursery school.

Language Development

Share the photos we post on Seesaw with your child and use these as a stimulus for conversation. This will encourage your child to talk to you about nursery school.

Early Mathematical Experiences

Encourage your child to become aware of, and match, colours and shapes in their environment.

The Arts

Encourage your child to sing, recite, beat the rhythm for the nursery rhymes we have suggested.

Physical Development & Movement

Visit a park or forest with your child and allow them to run around, climb, balance, swing, slide, and explore the environment. Being outdoors is a great enhancer of mental health and wellbeing and is so important in the aftermath of lockdowns.

The World Around Us

Please teach your child good hand and respiratory hygiene. You can check out 'Rufus the Hand washing Hero' which will help remind your child about the importance of washing their hands. Rufus is a furry cartoon monster who encourages children to follow five key steps to good hand washing - wet hands, use soap, rub for 20 seconds, rinse and dry.
